DIRECTOR'S NOTE



What does your America look like?

The answer of the person sitting next to you might shock you. We watched in horror as the events of the January 6 insurrection unfolded. Is this the new face of patriotism or a manifestation of an

embittered faction unwilling to accept a new truth? At what point does patriotic activism become domestic terrorism?

The plaque above the entrance doors to the San Francisco Playhouse reads "Our theatre is an empathy gym where we come to practice our powers of compassion." The characters in this story battle with the definition of truth, justice, and activism. Their views are radical and their methods unorthodox, so they are met with dismissal and alienation by the broader public. This rejection of extremism ostensibly promotes

peace, especially in the short term. But what happens when grievances, whether reasonable or rooted in misinformation and hatred, are swept under the rug and allowed to fester? We seem to have abandoned the idea that disagreement and open discourse are key features of a healthy democracy. I hope the villains in this story remind you of the power of compassion when dealing with the villains in your lives.

As the pandemic comes to a long-anticipated close, and we return with joy and relief to our pre-COVID-19 lifestyle, Lyric Theatre welcomes you back to Krannert Center. We are elated to be performing live for our patrons once more and thrilled to be producing new, engaging works like this one. Typically, we would say "sit back and enjoy the show," but today, as we relish the outdoor air and celebrate the return to normalcy, I urge you to lean in, engage, and condition those empathy muscles.

Stephanie Chiodras (Tink Enraught cover) graduated from Wheaton College with a BM in vocal Performance. In 2015, her freshman year, she was awarded Third Place in the First Year College/ Independent Women category of the Chicago Chapter of

NATS. In 2018, her senior year, she was awarded First Place in the Wheaton College Vocal Concerto Competition. Chiodras has performed in the Wheaton College Conservatory Opera Scenes as Laetita (Old Maid and the Thief) and mainstage operas in roles such as Papagena (The Magic Flute), Adele (Die Fledermaus), and La Musica and La Speranza (L'Orfeo). She has performed as a soloist with Wheaton College Concert Choir and Women's Chorale. Chiodras is currently pursuing her master's in vocal performance and literature at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign and played Susanna in last semester's production of W. A. Mozart's Le nozze di Figaro.



Thereza Lituma (Dee Dee Reyes) is a first-year master's student at the University of Illinois, studying voice under the tutelage of Sylvia Stone. Previously, she was a Project Inclusion Voice Fellow with the Grant Park Music Festival where she had the

opportunity to perform as a soloist in multiple Chicago summer concert series and as a professional chorus member with the Grant Park Chorus. Lituma's past opera credits include Lucretia (*The Rape of Lucretia*), Ježibaba/Third Wood Sprite (Rusalka), the Owl (The Adventures of Little Sharp-Ears), and Albanact (King Arthur). This season, she also performed the role of Mrs. Grose (The Turn of the Screw) and covered the role of Erika (Vanessa) with Lyric Theatre @ Illinois. For more information, visit therezalituma.com.



Lewis McAdow (Milcom Negley) is a baritone in his second year of the master's program at the University of Illinois where he pursues a degree in vocal performance and literature and studies with Yvonne Gonzales Redman. A native of Texas, he has

enjoyed his time on the stage with Lyric Theatre @ Illinois, performing the role of Harasta in the production of *The Adventures of Little Sharp-Ears* at Krannert Center. McAdow has also participated in multiple competitions, winning first place in Central Region NATS competition (2020), and was named a winner of the U of I Symphony Orchestra's Concerto Competition in March 2021. Past roles include Hanezò in Mascagni's *L'amico Fritz* and Grégorio in Gounod's *Romeo et Juliette* at the Moores Opera Center. Upcoming performances include the role of Barone Douphol in Giuseppe Verdi's *La traviata* at the Bay View Music Festival (Michigan) this summer.



Hunter Mitchell (Milcom Negley cover) attends the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign where he is pursuing a Master of Music in vocal performance and literature. He is in the studio of Nathan Gunn. In the past, Mitchell has been in numerous

shows with the University of North Alabama's opera/musical theatre program including the roles of Marcello in Puccini's La Bohème, James Mills in the collegiate premier of Ricky Ian Gordon's The House Without a Christmas Tree. Professor Bhaer in Little Women (musical), and The Wolf in Stephen Sondheim's Into the Woods, among many others. He has competed at the national level in competitions such as the National Association of Teachers of Singing competition where he competed in the national semi-finals in Boulder, Colorado in 2017. In the summers of 2018 and 2019, Mitchell performed in Falmouth, Massachusetts with the College Light Opera company for their 50th and 51st seasons. There, he held roles such as Olin Britt in Meredith Willson's The Music Man, Lank Hawkins in the Gershwins' Crazy for You, the Governor of Zeeland in Victor Herbert's The Red Mill, and one of his favorite roles, Talking Head in Stephen Schwartz's Pippin, in addition to numerous others. Mitchell's favorite shows are contemporary opera and golden age musical theatre, but he really just loves performing for people and learning new and exciting music with talented musicians more than anything.



Nicole Rodriguez Oliva (Dee Dee Reyes cover) is a senior in vocal performance pursuing her Bachelor of Music at the University of Illinois. She has played a variety of roles in opera scenes during Sylvia Stone's Scuolaltalia program in the summers of 2018 and

2019, from Cherubino in Le Nozze di Figaro to Flora in La traviata. At Krannert Center, she fulfilled the role of Woodpecker in the 2019 production of The Adventures of Little Sharp-Ears. She is currently working on a senior recital.



Kara Taft (Tink Enraught) is a second-year candidate for the Master of Music degree in vocal performance and literature at the University of Illinois School of Music, studying with Dawn Harris and Sarah Wigley. Prior performances with Lyric

Theatre @ Illinois include Countess Almaviva in scenes from Le Nozze di Figaro, the Marschallin in scenes from Der Rosenkavalier, Cousin Hebe in H.M.S. Pinafore with Sinfonia da Camera, and the Rooster in The Adventures of Little Sharp-Ears. A passionate performer of contemporary opera, she also premiered the role of Mem in the workshop performance of Paola Prestini and Brenda Shaughnessy's contemporary opera Sensorium Ex with Lyric Theatre @ Illinois and Beth Morrison Projects. Taft received her Bachelor of Music degree from the Lawrence University Conservatory of Music in Appleton, Wisconsin, in 2017 and has previously studied at the Balance Arts Center for the Alexander Technique in New York City and the Gaiety School of Acting in Dublin, Ireland. Theo Mynka (Stage Director), a native of Kharkiv, Ukraine, is graduating with an MM in vocal performance and literature from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign where he studies voice with Jerold Siena and Nathan Gunn. At Washington State University (WSU) where he earned his BM in music performance, he played the roles of Jack in Into the Woods, Igor in Young Frankenstein, Aaron in First Date, and Fenton in The Merry Wives of Windsor. A graduate of the Honors College at WSU, his special thesis images of their gods: a song cycle for voice and piano was awarded the merit of Pass with

Distinction. Recently, Mynka took part in Boston Conservatory's Summer Opera Intensive in Valencia, Spain, and the Franco-American Vocal Academy's Mozart Academy in Salzburg, Austria. His roles with Lyric Theatre @ Illinois include Songs for a New World, Ernst in Cabaret, Henrik in he pandemic-cancelled spring 2020 production of A Little Night Music, and Jason in Ordinary Days.
