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# PROGRAM NOTES

# **ROBERT SCHUMANN (1810–1856)**

Arabesque in C Major, Op. 18

Central to Schumann's music is the reflection of his so-called "split personality," that is, the free and happy Florestan side and the restrained and pensive Eusebius side, so named after the imaginary characters that Schumann created to express his life. How much this reflects his own mental illness resulting in his attempted suicide in 1854 by a leap into the icy Rhine and his death two years later in a mental institution, we shall leave to the psychiatrists. What we need to study is the glorious result of his compositional efforts despite, not because of, his sufferings. We might note, however, that Schumann was subject to the well-known conflict of two artists in a marriage. this time somewhat in reverse of Gustav and Alma Mahler or Ted Hughes and Sylvia Plath. On a tour of Russia with his more famous wife, Clara, he was asked whether "he, too, was a musician."

Schumann's work is clearly divided into periods of concentration on form. Most of his solo piano works come from his early compositional life between 1832 and 1839 and reflect his young Romantic warmth and imagination as well as the tragedies that would beset him and ultimately end his life. To his piano works he would add important songs, symphonies, and chamber music, but the piano pieces stand alone in their significance.

His own promising career as concert pianist was cut short by an injury to his right hand when he rigged a device intended to strengthen the weaker fingers. From that situation he turned only to composing and writing for his newly founded *Die Neue Zeitschrift für Musick* (New

Journal for Music). Into his many piano works he fused his love for music and literature, from his Op. 2 *Papaillons* (Butterflies), based on a novel by Jean Paul, to his Op. 133 *Gesänge Frühe* (Morning Songs), written only months before he threw himself into the icy Rhine on February 27, 1854. Between came such masterpieces as the Op. 18 *Arabesque* that we hear on this program. Together they form a body of works almost as important to the pianist as Chopin's.

Schumann wrote the Op. 18 Arabesque in 1839 at the age of twenty-nine. That particular date in time coincides with the difficulties of his love for Clara Wieck, whose father strongly opposed their marriage. While the situation furthered his bouts of depression, the work itself seems to overcome that with its poignancy and romantic spirit. It grandly fulfills the definition of an arabesque as a fanciful piano piece with ornamental passages accompanying or varying a theme.

# **JOHANN SEBASTIAN BACH (1685-1750)**

**Goldberg Variations** 

Over all composers looms Bach, whose music, though often defined as quintessentially Baroque, knows no boundaries and somehow suffers few ills from its many translations. In Bach, the whole is never a simple sum of the parts. His contrapuntal writing, for example, is more than a mere use of multiple voices at once, but rather a disciplining of those lines into profoundly expressive music that transcends style or technique. Bach is as inventive as Beethoven and as modern, in many ways, as Ravel. Chopin, who represents the soul of Romanticism, looked to him as a model for his famous 24 Preludes. He stands alone in his transcendence of style

and impact. As George Bernard Shaw said of him, "Bach belongs not to the past, but to the future—perhaps the near future." With the beauty and popularity of his work, it is difficult to grasp that it went unheard for a century until Felix Mendelssohn generated a new appreciation of Bach with a performance of the St. Matthew Passion in 1829.

Bach stayed close to home, spending twentyseven of his productive years in Leipzig (1723–50). Prior to that, six productive years in Köthen brought such works as the Six Suites for Unaccompanied Cello, the Sonatas and Partitas for Solo Violin, and the Brandenburg Concertos.

The scholarly debate over this monumental work is so complex and even contentious at times, that perhaps it is best to take a simpler approach in this note. In a word, this set of 30 variations on an opening and closing aria is inarguably one of the most complex and demanding works ever written for keyboard. Even the title page of the manuscript, published in 1741, with its directive "Composed for Music Lovers to Refresh Their Spirits," suggests that it was no piece for the uninitiated. While Bach's famous set The Well-Tempered Clavier can serve as a resource for the improvement of keyboard technique, the Goldberg Variations assumes only the most virtuosic of players. None but the brave attempt it.

The apocryphal tale spun by Bach's first biographer, Johann Nicolas Forkel, tells us that the title "Goldberg" refers to harpsichordist Johan Gottleib Goldberg who was asked to play the Variations to sooth the sleepless nights of Count Keyserlingk, who had brought Goldberg to Leipzig to study with Bach. Supposedly Bach received a golden goblet filled with a hundred gold pieces from the Count, although there is no record of that in Bach's estate.

Perhaps more telling than the spurious historical information on the work, is to listen to the Variations in their entirety and then to consider them as an aria with a set of 30 brilliant pieces or, perhaps more importantly, as a whole. Their genius is readily evident from both aspects. Together they form a work of infinite variety in mood, texture, harmony, melody, rhythm and structure. Governing all is a complexity that develops almost like a Greek drama with a climax and a denouement and even, to stretch a point, with the suggestion of a chorus. (One scholar, David Humphreys, sees them as an ascent through the nine spheres of Ptolemaic cosmology.) When the complexity develops to the point where one can almost bear no more, Bach offers us a kind momentary relief most evident in the nine canons that seem to anchor the work. These canons occur at regular intervals, that is, at every third variation up to and including Variation 27. Then comes almost a touch of humor in the surprising Variation 30 "Quodlibet" that concludes the set before the return of the opening Aria. A quodlibet is a contrapuntal piece based on several melodies, in this case, two folk tunes, "I long have been away from you/Come here, come here, come here," and "Cabbage and turnips have driven me away/Had my mother cooked meat, I'd have chosen to stay."

In the liner notes of his famous 1956 recording of the Goldberg Variations, pianist Glen Gould commented on the work: It is, in short, music which observes neither end nor beginning, music with neither real climax nor real resolution, music which, like Baudelaire's lovers "rest lightly on the wings of the unchecked wind."

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# **PROFILE**



Lang Lang is a leading figure in classical music today—as a pianist, educator, and philanthropist he has become one of the world's most influential and committed ambassadors for the arts in the 21st century. Equally happy playing for billions of viewers

at the 2008 Olympic Opening Ceremony in Beijing or just for a few hundred children in the public schools, he is a master of communicating through music.

Heralded by the *New York Times* as "the hottest artist on the classical music planet," Lang Lang plays sold-out concerts all over the world. He has formed ongoing collaborations with conductors including Sir Simon Rattle, Gustavo Dudamel, Daniel Barenboim, and Christoph Eschenbach and performs with all the world's top orchestras. Lang Lang is known for thinking outside the box and frequently steps into different musical worlds. His performances at the GRAMMY Awards with Metallica, Pharrell Williams or jazz legend Herbie Hancock were watched by millions of viewers.

For about a decade Lang Lang has contributed to musical education worldwide. In 2008 he founded the Lang Lang International Music Foundation aimed at cultivating tomorrow's top pianists, championing music education at the forefront of technology, and building a young audience through live music experiences. In 2013 Lang Lang was designated by the Secretary General of the United Nations as a Messenger of Peace focusing on global education.

Lang Lang started playing the piano aged three, and gave his first public recital before the age of five. He entered Beijing's Central Music Conservatory aged nine, and won First Prize at the International Tchaikovsky Competition for Young Musicians at 13. He subsequently went to Philadelphia to study with legendary pianist Gary Graffman at the Curtis Institute of Music. He was seventeen when his big break came, substituting for André Watts at the Gala of the Century, playing Tchaikovsky's First Piano Concerto with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Christoph Eschenbach: he became an overnight sensation and the invitations started to pour in.

Lang Lang's boundless drive to attract new audiences to classical music has brought him tremendous recognition: he was presented with the 2010 Crystal Award in Davos and was picked as one of the 250 Young Global Leaders by the World Economic Forum. He is also the recipient of honorary doctorates from the Royal College of Music, the Manhattan School of Music and New York University. In December 2011 he was honoured with the highest prize awarded by the Ministry of Culture of the People's Republic of China and received the highest civilian honours in Germany (Merit of the Federal Republic of Germany) and France (Medal of the Order of Arts and Letters). In 2016 Lang Lang was invited to the Vatican to perform for Pope Francis. He has also performed for numerous other international dignitaries, including four US presidents and monarchs from many nations.
