CONCERT DIRECTOR'S NOTE

The great American author Toni Morrison wrote, "This is precisely the time when artists go to work. There is no time for despair, no place for self-pity, no room for fear. We speak, we write, we do language." As dance artists, the language of movement is how we make sense of the world. We drop our weight, reconnect to the earth beneath our feet, and charge the space before us. We ramp up the intensity of a movement to create one effect or recalibrate and slow things down to achieve a different outcome. We understand that movement can serve as a salve for the human condition. Movement is medicine. And there is no better time to engage in movement than right now. Welcome to February Dance 2025!

Tonight's performance, entitled Fast Forward, features an array of faculty and graduate student voices that celebrate Dance at Illinois' fierce commitment to artistic innovation. We begin with Professor Rebecca Nettl-Fiol's Ayre inspired by Osvaldo Golijov's song cycle of the same name. In collaboration with soprano Elena Negruta, Professor Nettl-Fiol weaves together music with origins from folk songs of Southern Spain in the late 15th century, when Arab, Jewish, and Christian cultures lived in relative harmony. Ayre is a piece about breaking down walls, political, cultural, and stylistic. MFA candidate Gabriel Bruno Eng Gonzalez's title Stunning! references Legacy Russell's concept of 'Glitched Bodies'— Black, trans, and femme bodies that, through the glitch aesthetic, "rupture the in-between of

recognized and recognizable and extend such ruptures to becoming fantastic landscapes of possibility." Utilizing live-manipulated Zoom videos, a roving monitor, and rolling green screens, the dancers emphasize the labor and expertise behind crafting a polished digital avatar, creating a performance between the digital and the IRL (in real life). Banafsheh Amiri presents her MFA thesis work, Khazan (Autumn). Creating a layered sensorial world, Banafsheh explores the passage from reconciliation and resilience to transformation when autumn creates a space for growth and transition. Khazan (Autumn) evokes a deep hope for fresh beginnings as it reflects on the journey of Iranian women in the current era protesting for change.

We round out the evening with AGE, a cochoreographed contemporary ballet work that began as part of a class I co-taught with MFA '24 alum Anna Peretz Rogovoy. AGE explores nongender-specific partnering and the increasingly popular phenomenon of "sneaker ballets" to create new choreography that centers connection and collaboration.

Dance at Illinois is proud to launch the return to the Colwell Playhouse since its recent renovation. Sit back, enjoy, and prepare to be moved into worlds real and imagined as Dance at Illinois presents *Fast Forward*.

As the daughter of renowned ethnomusicologist Bruno Nettl, music has always played a central role in my life and my choreographic research. My world view, values, and musical palette were shaped during my formative years by an immersion in other cultures through travel and listening to diverse music from around the world. When my friend Elena Negruta introduced me to Golijov's Ayre, I was profoundly moved by the power and beauty of this music, recalling a time when Arab, Jewish, and Christian cultures lived in relative harmony in the Andalusian Middle Ages. It felt particularly relevant in this time of discord, to immerse ourselves in this music, to explore the rich textures and lush mix of cultural influences and emotions that weave through the cycle of songs.

We have selected 7 of the 11 songs in the complete song cycle. The lyrics are sung in various languages including Arabic, Hebrew, Spanish, and Sardinian. We chose not to include the lyrics in the program, as the dance does not directly depict nor interpret the words-- words cannot always say what needs to be said. Allow yourself to be transported into a world of complexity and beauty.

NOTES

Contemporary ballet stems from "classical" ballet vocabulary but simultaneously resists and deviates from its traditions. It challenges an either/or paradigm, allowing dancers to draw from a wide canon of movement traditions. We had several questions that guided our studio research: Can we make ballet that is relevant to the times we are living in? Can we anchor ourselves to curiosity about the present moment, rather than preoccupying ourselves with a future product? Can contemporary ballet's physical juxtapositions of groundedness against high relevé (rising), risk against balance, and improvisation against form direct the dancers to personal freedom? We continue to explore these and many other questions.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

This work began during a Choreographic Laboratory course in the spring of 2024 and includes choreographic contributions from the 18 students enrolled in that course. A version of this work was performed as a duet by Paige and Anna at the 2024 Cleveland Dance Festival.

PROFILES



Paige Cunningham Caldarella (Concert Director/Choreographer) is a dance educator, choreographer, performer, and mother whose research interests include contemporary ballet and codified modern dance techniques. She's

presented her ballet research entitled Barre Lab: Embodying Change with educator Emily Stein at NDEO, ILDEO, and CORPS de Ballet International. She is working on a new duet, entitled Ponzy Scheme, in collaboration with fellow dance artist Alfonso Cervera that recently premiered at the Cleveland Dance Fest. Caldarella joined the dance faculty at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign in 2022, after fifteen years on faculty at the Dance Center of Columbia College Chicago. She performed with the Merce Cunningham Dance Company, touring nationally and internationally, and worked with The Seldoms, Darrell Jones, Timothy Buckley, and Onye Ozuzu among others. She holds a BFA from the Juilliard School and an MFA from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.



Banafsheh Amiri (Choreographer) is an Iranian dance artist, choreographer, and instructor. She is a third-year MFA candidate in dance at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, with her research focused on Iranian dance and

choreography. Over the past eighteen years, she has been dedicated to creating methodologies for developing Iranian dance, choreographically and pedagogically. Banafsheh's lifelong practice and investigation of Iranian dance has been impacted by her discovery of the complexity of Iranian traditional music. Having been trained since 2013, she became a vocalist in Radifhaye-Avazi (Iranian traditional modal songs), dedicated to enriching the vocabulary of Iranian dance. To promote the new Iranian dance methodology, Banafsheh founded the Miniature Dance Academy and established the Miniature Dance Group in 2012, which educated and performed for women in Tehran, Iran until 2022. In addition to an extensive experience in Iranian classical, contemporary, and folkloric dances, she is an expert in Cuban-style salsa. A multidisciplinary artist, Banafsheh holds a BFA in painting from the Tehran Alzahra University and an MFA in interior design from the University of Brighton.



Gabriel Bruno Eng Gonzalez

(Choreographer for *Stunning!*) (he/they) loves screens. Stunning! Gabriel is a classically trained ballet dancer with an aptitude for soft diplomacy via the United States Department of State

(Fulbright Scholar 2020–2022) and securing grants from the Mellon Foundation (HRI Interseminars Fellow: *Improvise and Intervene*). He is a cross-dressing California native who believes that creating art aimed to understand glamour and the societal capacity for beauty is the way to focus our collective imaginations. In a world that unironically asks "are gay people people?" and "should trans people exist?" Gabriel answers with A FIVE SIX SEVEN EIGHT! I'm screenshotting now! Clear the frame! Loop 1 done! Let's do makeup this next run! Gabriel's work has shown up at multiple gay midwestern fringe festivals, gay film festivals, and the Chicago Cultural Center. He is a graduate of Beloit College and an MFA candidate here at Dance at Illinois.



Rebecca Nettl-Fiol (Choreographer), Professor of dance at the University of Illinois, is a choreographer, educator, and author. Her research includes the integration of the Alexander technique principles to dance training, resulting in her

co-authored book, Dance and the Alexander Technique: Exploring the Missing Link, as well as a new book currently in press, Moving into Skill: A Framework for Integration. Other publications include The Body Eclectic: Evolving Practices in Dance Training and a chapter in Mindful Movement: The Somatic Arts and Conscious Action. A frequent presenter and guest teacher throughout the US and abroad, she is also the recipient of the University of Illinois Campus Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching. Her choreography has been produced regularly at Krannert Center since 1982 for Dance at Illinois as well as University of Illinois Opera Theatre and Lyric Theatre @ Illinois. Her work has also been presented at Merce Cunningham Studio, Performance Space 122, and American Dance Guild Performance Festivals in New York: Links Hall and Harvest Chicago Contemporary Dance Festival in Chicago; Frente de Danze Independienta Sala de Artes Escenicas de Jesus in Ecuador; and at numerous American College Dance Festivals. She has choreographed over 50 opera and musical theatre productions at venues including Champaign-Urbana Theatre Company, Station Theatre, Peoria Civic Opera, Millikin University, State University of New York at Potsdam, Interlochen Center for the Arts, and Krannert Center.

Anna Peretz Rogovoy



(Choreographer) is a dance artist and educator currently based in the US Midwest. Her choreographic research is located at the collision of rigorous formalism and grotesque humanity, offering a

critical queer feminist perspective on ecology, gendered bodies, and dance itself. Anna was based in New York City from 2013–2021 after earning a BA in dance and literature from Bennington College (Bennington, Vermont). While in New York City, Anna became involved with the Merce Cunningham Trust, performing multiple reconstructions of Cunningham's work and most recently being authorized as a teacher of Cunningham Technique. Anna's choreography, called "moving architecture, sculptural and strong" by The Dance Enthusiast, has been presented in many New York City venues as well as in upstate New York, Massachusetts, Vermont, Illinois, Ohio, Michigan, and Wisconsin. She holds an MFA in dance from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, where she had the honor of performing in works by faculty including Sara Hook, Rebecca Nettl-Fiol, Tere O'Connor, and Dr. Cynthia Oliver. Anna is on faculty at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, teaching ballet, contemporary, composition, and serving as Director of Recruitment.
