





### **MEET THE ARTISTS**

Classically trained violinist Kevin "Kev Marcus" Sylvester and violist Wil "Wil B." Baptiste first met up at their Fort Lauderdale performing arts high school before reuniting post-college to form Black Violin, which celebrates the synergy between classical and

hip-hop music. Their name was inspired by an album by famous swing-era African-American jazz violinist Stuff Smith.

The high-energy duo has been named one of South by Southwest's

hottest bands, was awarded a Showtime at the Apollo Legend title, and has performed with Kanye West, Ciara, Lil Wayne, Nas, Alicia Keys, Wu-Tang Clan, and Aerosmith. Backed live by their band featuring turntable ace DJ SPS, they've given rise to a distinct musical voice that is at once "delicate, different and, dare it be said, funky" (OZY Media).

Wil B. attempted to join the school band in an effort to play the saxophone at age 13 but was mistakenly put into the string program. As luck would have it, he mastered the viola and grew to love it. He has participated with local pop orchestras such as the Young Artist Contemporary Orchestra in Palm Beach, Florida, and attended Florida State University. Wil B. also sings and plays piano, drums, trumpet, and bass guitar. His influences include some well-known musical artists such as Stevie Wonder, George Benson, Curtis Mayfield, Chaka Khan, Victor Wooten, Common, AZ, Jill Scott, and Talib Kweli.

Kev Marcus was encouraged by his mother and teachers at the age of nine to learn the violin. From there he grew so intrigued by it that he couldn't let it go. He began to participate with the local pop orchestras and was also a semi-finalist in the Sphinx National Competition for Blacks and Latinos in 2000. He went to college at Florida International University, where he met their manager Sam G. His musical artist influences are past great pioneers of the music world such as Herbie Hancock, Stuff Smith, Mozart, Bach, Brahms, and Nat King Cole. Kev Marcus also has been influenced by some of today's artists such as Mos Def, Notorious BIG, Dr. Dre, The Roots, Nas, and Jay-Z.

#### THE ROLE OF THE DJ

Hip-hop DJs cut and loop beats to recreate phrases of music. They use two identical tracks of music, spinning one track to a place where the music stops but the beat keeps going. This is called the "break" and allows the DJ to go back and forth between the two tracks to create one long beat. DJs can also pause, scratch, backspin, speed up or slow down, and/or delay the music to create other effects.

### VIOLIN VS. VIOLA

WIL B.

You will notice that the two string players of Black Violin actually don't play the same instrument. Look and listen for these subtle differences between violins and violas:

#### **VIOLA**

Thicker strings played with a heftier bow

Tuned to ADGC

Bigger both in width and length

Deep sound

Music is read on the alto clef



#### **VIOLIN**

"we studied classical, but we lived rap music"

Thinner, usually synthetic strings played with a lighter bow

Tuned to EADG (though a fifth string can be added)

Smaller overall

Makes a higher sound

Music is read on the treble clef

# SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES

- Listen to a track by Black Violin and draw or write what comes to mind while listening. Contrast this by listening to a hip-hop song or the music of a classical composer of your choice.
- 2. Research one of the following topics and share what you learn:

J.S. Bach

How stringed instruments are made

Acoustic versus electric violins

3. Go on an Internet treasure hunt. Check out hip-hop songs and videos that have sampled classical music, and listen to the source music as well. For example, listen to "Brandenburg" from Black Violin's debut album, and the beginning of J. S. Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 3 in G Major. Or, try Nas's "I Can" and Beethoven's Für Elise. How does the classical music fit into the hiphop song? Why do you think the artist chose that music to sample or work with?
