Sullivan Playwright-in-Residence **MATTHEW-LEE ERLBACH**, a University of Illinois Champaign-Urbana alumni, is an actor and playwright from Chicago and New York City whose plays include his critically acclaimed solo play, *Handbook for an American Revolutionary* (Gym at Judson) and *Eager to Lose*, a *Burlesque Farce in Rhyming Verse* (Ars Nova). His work has been developed with The New Group, Vineyard, Ars Nova, MCC, Williamstown, NYTW, and Orchard Project. A Humanitas Prize New Voices Award recipient, his work has been supported by the National Endowment for the Arts, the Puffin Foundation, and the Laurents/Hatcher Foundation. He was also an Ars Nova's 2014-15 Play Group member. TV Credits include *Masters of Sex* (Showtime), *Gypsy* (Netflix), Nickelodeon, and WWE. A proud graduate of the public school system from K through college, he

volunteers with Habitat for Humanity. He runs a writing program he created for single mothers transitioning out of homelessness and prison.

THE DANIEL J. SULLIVAN PLAYWRIGHT-IN-RESIDENCE program is a supportive space for both emerging and established playwrights, providing them a haven to explore bold narrative concepts and innovative forms. The program creates an environment that encourages deep artistic exploration. This program fulfills the desire of Champaign-Urbana audiences to gain insight into the developmental process of theatrical scripts.
