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CELEBRATING 63 YEARS OF MUSIC



1959

The "Champaign-Urbana Civic Symphony Orchestra" was founded in 1959 by music lovers in our community who had the dream of establishing a permanent and professional symphony orchestra. Funded by local

businesses and more than 300 subscribers, the orchestra performed the opening concert in Smith Hall on October 20,1960 under the leadership of Bernard Goodman. The concert was hailed "a magnificent success" by *The News-Gazette* and the new orchestra flourished with the help of the Symphony Guild that was formed in 1962.

CUSO began performing at the newly-built Krannert Center for the Performing Arts in 1969 and was designated the professional orchestra in residence at Krannert Center in 1988. Over the years, CUSO has performed more than 350 concerts and showcased the talents of thousands of local, professional musicians, bringing the magic of music to audiences of all ages. In partnership with the Guild, CUSO youth music programs have introduced thousands of grade school children to the vibrancy of live orchestral music, with Youth Concerts at Krannert Center and free concerts in the schools.

For the past 63 years, CUSO has thrived with community support.

CUSO is an independent 501(c)(3) non-profit organization and receives no funding from Krannert Center or the University of Illinois. Like orchestras throughout the country, more than 60% of our budget is funded by the generous support of sponsors and donors.

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

STEPHEN ALLTOP

Stephen Alltop is celebrating his tenth season as Music Director and Conductor of the Champaign-Urbana Symphony Orchestra. He also serves as Music Director and Conductor for the Apollo Chorus of Chicago and the Elmhurst Symphony Orchestra. Dr. Alltop has been a member of Northwestern University's conducting and keyboard faculties since 1994, where he conducts the Alice Millar Chapel Choir and the Baroque Music Ensemble.

Stephen Alltop has appeared with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra as both a harpsichord and organ soloist, and performs frequently with Chicago's Music of The Baroque. He has performed with Boston's Handel and Haydn Society, Chicago Bach Project, Chicago Sinfonietta, Grant Park Symphony Orchestra, Joffrey Ballet, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Melbourne Symphony Orchestra, Minnesota Orchestra, Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra, Omaha Symphony, the Peninsula Music Festival and Ravinia Festival. Alltop served as Coordinator and performer for WFMT's Bach Organ Project in the fall of 2014, a live performance series of all of Bach's organ works, and the WFMT Bach Keyboard Festival for the fall of 2015. His recordings are on the Albany, American Gramaphone, Cedille and Clarion labels.

Alltop has performed with many leading musicians and actors of our time, including Hilary Hahn, Orli Shaham, Tony Randall, Martin Sheen, and Brian Dennehy. He has prepared ensembles for the Ravinia Festival, Chicago Opera Theater. The Oprah Winfrey Show, Star Wars in Concert, and Josh Groban on Tour.

Dr. Alltop has guest conducted numerous orchestras and choruses across the United States, Europe and Korea. His guest conducting

CUSO ASSISTANT CONDUCTOR

NATHAN SAWYER

Nathan Sawyer is pursuing a DMA in Orchestral Conducting under Dr. Carolyn Watson at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (UIUC). He is currently Assistant Conductor of the Champaign-Urbana Symphony Orchestra and the Teaching Assistant (and Assistant Conductor) for the University of Illinois Philharmonia Orchestra under Dr. Stephen Fairbanks. He also serves as Assistant Conductor of the Illini Strings.



Nathan began his conducting studies in

2016 as an undergraduate student while pursuing his undergraduate Music Education degree with Dr. Paul Shewan. While studying at Roberts Wesleyan College, he received opportunities to work with the Roberts Wesleyan College Community Orchestra and several other ensembles on campus for various events such as a Suicide Prevention Chapel Service for which he composed and conducted the piece *It Takes a Moment.* Understanding the challenges of mental health, the work speaks to the fact that everyone is worth more than they could ever possibly imagine, even if they cannot fathom that at that moment.

In the summer of 2019, Nathan was accepted to attend the International Conducting Workshop and Festival in Bulgaria, where he studied with instructors Larry Rachleff and Donald Schleicher, conducting pieces by Beethoven, Dvořák, and Stravinsky.

Subsequently, Nathan was offered a place as a Master of Music in Orchestral Conducting candidate at UIUC, studying under Donald Schleicher and serving as the Teaching Assistant for the University of Illinois Symphony Orchestra. While at UIUC, he also studied with interim professor William Eddins and rehearsed and performed John Harbison's Symphony No. 5 in the presence of the composer.

Nathan hopes to continue his love for music education by becoming an orchestra director at a university. In his spare time, Nathan trains for Spartan Races and has completed two Trifectas in his life. He also runs a small LEGO YouTube channel as a hobby.

GUEST CONDUCTOR



ANDREW MEGILL

Andrew Megill is recognized as one of America's finest choral conductors, admired for both his passionate artistry and his unusually wideranging repertoire, which extends from early music to newly composed works. He serves as Suzanne and William Allen Distinguished Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities at the University of Illinois (Urbana-Champaign), where he leads the country's oldest doctoral

program in choral conducting. His performances have been praised for their "power, subtlety, and nuance" and "profound spirituality" [Le Devoir, Montreal], and have been described as "piercing the heart like a frozen knife" [Monterey Herald] and "leaving the audience gasping in amazement" [Classical NJ].

Dr. Megill frequently leads many of North America's finest professional vocal ensembles. He is the Conductor of the Montreal Symphony Orchestra Chorus, Artistic Advisor and Director of Choral Activities for the Carmel Bach Festival, Choral Director for Chicago's Music of the Baroque, and Artistic Director of Fuma Sacra. This year, he guest conducts The Thirteen in Washington, D.C., and the Trinity Wall Street Choir in Manhattan. In addition, Dr. Megill also regularly collaborates with the world's leading orchestras, preparing choirs for the Cleveland Orchestra, Dresden Philharmonie, Montreal Symphony Orchestra, National Symphony, and the New York Philharmonic for conductors including Pierre Boulez, Charles Dutoit, Joseph Flummerfelt, Rafael Frühbeck du Burgos, Alan Gilbert, Jane Glover, Neeme Järvi, Zdenek Macal, Kurt Masur, Zubin Mehta, Kent Nagano, John Nelson, Rafael Payare, and Julius Rudel. An accomplished orchestral conductor, he has led the Montreal Symphony Orchestra, Spoleto Festival Orchestra, I Musici de Montréal Chamber Orchestra, Bang on a Can All-Stars, the Champaign-Urbana Symphony Orchestra, and Sinfonia da Camera (Urbana, IL).

Dr. Megill is particularly admired for his performances of Baroque choral works. He regularly collaborates with leaders in the field of historically-informed performance, including Masaaki Suzuki, Ton Koopman, Bruno Weil, Andrea Marcon, Herve Niquet, and Paul McCreesh. He has conducted many period-instrument orchestras and has led Bach festivals at the University of Illinois, Westminster Choir College, the University of Missouri-Kansas City, and in Ireland at the Dublin Institute of Technology.

UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS CHAMBER SINGERS

The University of Illinois Chamber Singers is the premiere choral ensemble at the University, comprised of experienced and outstanding singers from across the entire student body. The ensemble, conducted by Dr. Andrew Megill, explores a broad range of choral music, from Medieval chant to newly commissioned works, while demonstrating the highest level of musical excellence.

The Chamber Singers hosts an annual Baroque Festival in the spring that allows students to collaborate with nationally renowned Baroque specialists and performers. In addition to playing an active role in the community, the group regularly reaches out to connect with school programs across the state. The ensemble tours nationally and internationally, most recently singing concerts in Sweden and Estonia in the summer of 2022, and can be heard at conventions of America's leading choral organizations.

KATELYN LEE

Recognized by Chicago Classical Review as having a "beautifully bright" and "silvery" tone, American soprano Katelyn Lee is making her mark in Chicago and across the United States. Known for her ability to sing numerous styles with ease, Katelyn is regularly sought after to perform opera, art song, musical theatre, and oratorio. This versatility has provided her with the opportunity to collaborate with notable arts organizations across the country.

Katelyn has performed numerous opera and musical theatre roles. Most recently, she performed the title role in Lyric Opera of Chicago's production of *Hansel and Gretel*. Katelyn has sung in multiple productions at Lyric Opera and other companies such as Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, Haymarket Opera Company, Chicago Opera Theater, Ozarks Lyric Opera, Cedar Rapids Opera, and Folks Operetta. Notable roles include Romilda in *Serse*, Rosina in *The Barber of Seville*, Doris Parker in Charlie Parker's *Yardbird*, Antonia in *Man of La Mancha*, Cunegonde in *Candide*, Madame Goldentrill in *The Impresario*, Zerlina in *Don Giovanni*, and the Female Narrator in the world premiere of *Jason and the Argonauts*.

In concert, Katelyn has sung a wide variety of repertoire. She is an expert in Baroque performance practice and is a frequent soloist with Music of the Baroque, led by world-renowned conductor, Dame Jane Glover. Other credits include Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, Indianapolis Baroque Orchestra, Northwest Indiana Symphony, Elgin Symphony Orchestra, Champaign-Urbana Symphony, Fort Wayne Philharmonic Orchestra, and Chicago a cappella.

Katelyn received her Master of Music degree at Indiana University Jacobs School of Music and her Bachelor of Music degree at Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. She is currently based in Chicago and lives with her husband, tenor Joe Shadday and their cat, Liza.



JOE SHADDAY

Indianapolis native, tenor Joe Shadday, is thrilled to be debuting with the Champaign-Urbana Symphony Orchestra. Most recently he appeared as Hoxton in the Lyric Opera of Chicago production of *My Fair Lady*. Mr. Shadday is a winner of the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions. He is a skilled crossover artist and has appeared as Enoch Snow in the Glimmerglass Festival production of *Carousel*.

Additionally, Mr. Shadday has performed with Santa Fe Opera, Chicago Opera Theatre, Indianapolis Opera, Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, Grant Park Music Festival, Charlottesville Opera, Kentucky Opera, Pensacola Opera, and was a previous member of the Cantus vocal ensemble. He is currently a member of the chorus of the Lyric Opera of Chicago.

Mr. Shadday received his Master of Music from the University of Maryland where he studied under Leon Major and his Bachelors of Music from DePauw University. CENTRAL ILLINOIS YOUTH CHORUS

Enriching the lives of children since 1978, Central Illinois Youth Chorus (CIYC) provides choral music instruction, vocal training, and performance opportunities to youth in kindergarten through twelfth grade. Based in Champaign-Urbana, the Chorus includes four choir levels and draws members from surrounding communities and counties. Members are taught sound vocal technique, musicianship, and performance etiquette while learning repertoire covering a diverse range of music, languages, and composers. CIYC choristers experience the joy, discipline, pride, and teamwork of high-quality choral singing.

ANDREA SOLYA, ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Andrea Solya, DMA, is Associate Director of Choral Studies and Teaching Associate Professor of Choral Music at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where she is director of the UI Women's Glee Club, UIUCs' premier treble choir. She teaches choral conducting and literature to undergraduate and graduate students.

In addition to her duties at the University of Illinois, Andrea serves as the Artistic

Director of the Central Illinois Youth Chorus. Each summer she teaches musicianship, conducting and choral methodology in the Master's program of the Kodály Institute at Capital University in Columbus, Ohio. Her research interests include the choral music of Andreas Rauch (1592-1656), as well as the art of teaching sight singing to the choral singer and beyond.

Andrea has performed and presented on national and international stages and has been working on a critical edition of 25 motets from Andreas Rauch's 1625 collection "Thymiaterium Musicale." Under her direction the UI Women's Glee Club has received numerous concert invitations and has undertaken memorable tours to Nashville, New Orleans, Atlanta and to New York City. The UI Women's Glee Club also appears on renowned composer Augusta Read Thomas's latest CD recording, "Astral Canticle," released in 2015 by Nimbus Records. Dr. Solya is Treble Choir Repertoire and Standards Committee Chair at ACDA-II.

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engagements have included "A Celebration of Celtic Music" at Chicago's Symphony Center, the Iowa All-State Orchestra, and Brahms' Ein deutsches Requiem in Busan, South Korea for the International Schools Choral Music Society. He has conducted opera and orchestral concerts with a number of Italian orchestras, including I Soloisti di Perugia, Fondazione Arturo Toscanini (Bologna), Teatro Reggio Orchestra (Parma), Festival Mozart (Roverto), Orchestra Sinfonica (Bari), Teatro Piccinni (Bari), and the Festival Duni (Matera). His performances have been broadcast on Medici TV, RAI Italian Radio and Television, and the WFMT Fine Arts Network. Dr.Alltop has worked closely with leading composers of the day, including residency projects with Stacy Garrop, John Corigliano, Jeff Beal, Eleanor Daley, Stephen Paulus and Eric Whitacre, and has conducted world premieres of works by John Luther Adams, Jan Bach, Frank Ferko, Stephen Paulus, Joseph Schwantner, Alan Terricciano, and others.

Dr. Alltop lectures frequently for the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, the Northwestern University Alumnae Continuing Education Series, Osher Lifelong Learning Institute, and other organizations. Since 2014, he has given presentations on leadership for various programs in the Kellogg School of Business.

Stephen is an avid squash player and baseball fan, and recently completed a personal fitness goal of running ten marathons and twenty half-marathons over a ten-year period.

Dr. Megill previously served as Music Director of the Masterwork Chorus and Orchestra (with whom he frequently performed in Carnegie and Avery Fisher Halls) and Chorusmaster for the Spoleto Festival USA (where he trained "the finest opera chorus in the world" [Charleston Post and Courier]). He has been a guest artist with the Yale Institute of Sacred Music, TENET vocal ensemble, the Juilliard Opera Center, and Emmanuel Music (Boston), and served as interim choirmaster for Trinity Church (Wall Street) in Manhattan. Prior to his appointment at the University of Illinois, he taught at Westminster Choir College for more than twenty years.

Dr. Megill is a frequent champion of music of our own time. He has conducted regional or world premieres of works by Caleb Burhans, Paul Chihara, Dominic DiOrio, Sven-David Sandstrom, Caroline Shaw, Lewis Spratlan, Steven Stucky, Jon Magnussen, Stephen Andrew Taylor, Arvo Pärt, and Krzysztof Penderecki, and has collaborated with the Mark Morris Dance Company, folk singer Judy Collins, puppeteer Basil Twist, and filmmaker Ridley Scott. Recordings of choirs conducted or prepared by him may be heard on the Decca, EMI, Canteloupe, Naxos, Albany, and CBClabels.



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
